



**CHULA VISTA COMMUNITY COLLABORATIVE
PARTNERS MEETING MINUTES
November 12, 2019**

1. Executive Director, Margarita Holguin, welcomed all organizations and stated the introduction.
2. **AARP- Fraudwatch Network**

Chequitta Falls presented on data and how it's a threat that affects everyone, but has many target seniors and college-aged students. 15million adults experienced identity fraud in 2018, losing nearly 15 billion dollars. Some of the recommendations are- to put a freeze on your credit, change passwords every 3 months, use 20 character passwords, set up online access to accounts and monitor them.

3. **South Bay Community Services- First 5 First Steps**

Michelle Favela spoke about First 5 First Steps (F5FS) program, Mi Escuelita, and their support in the community through home visits, development services, mental health counseling and domestic violence services. They provide family support through, an evidence based model, and works on prevention with families. F5FS is able to follow a family for 3 years for immigrants, military families, teen, low income, and Calworks recipients. In their program, they are able to offer evidence based curricula, support of parent-child relationship, positive parenting skills, child development screening, family goals, referral coordination, health and wellness support, as well as social support opportunities. <https://southbaycommunityservices.org/mi-escuelita/>
4. **UCSD Shiley- Marcos Alzheimer's Disease Research Center**

Jade Serrano presented on the opportunity to be part of various studies through UCSD Shiley on Alzheimer's Diseases. They offer free community memory screenings in their La Jolla clinic and throughout the South Bay. The Longitudinal Study aims to gather information to help with early detection, accurate diagnosis, and directions for targeted treatment through a 30-year study. The Caregiver Study looks at caregivers' vs non-caregivers; Latino vs non-Latino and measures depression, anxiety, sleep, thinking (memory) socializing. Participant must be 50 years of age, and functioning normally in day-to-day like. The Armada Study uses technological devices for assessing cognition in seniors and aging Spanish speakers. Eligibility- healthy Spanish speaking individual 65 or older, individuals with MCI or Alzheimer's. 5. **Chula Vista Welfare Council**

Christina Ross spoke about the Chula Vista Welfare Council and their efforts in the upcoming holiday season. They are looking for volunteers for their food-packing event from Dec 7-Dec 12. 6. **Alliance San Diego- Public Charge**

Itzel Guillen presented on Public Charge and how it affects our communities. Public charge changed August 12, 2019, however, a proposed rule change was to be reviewed by courts October 15. On Oct 11, a hold was placed due to multiple federal judges issued temp injunctions against the Trump Administration public charge rule.

The new definition states, Public Charge will be considered for a person who receives one or more public benefits for more than 12 months in a 3 years period. Previous definition- Public Charge is a term used by US immigration officials to refer to a person who is considered likely to become primarily dependent on the government for subsistence. The totality of circumstances looks at- Age 18-61, health, family, status, financial status, educations and skills, affidavit of support, new form I-944, surety bond. Public benefits include- federal, state local, tribal cash assistance, long term care, SSI, Snap- Cal Fresh (Federal Level), Temporary assistance for needy families, public section 8, Medicaid. Benefits not included- Children health insurance, EIC, CA Food Assistance Program, Medicaid (children under 21, emergency, pregnant woman (until 60 days after birth)). Who does this NOT affect- Legal Permanent Residents (green card holders 5 plus years pf LPR status), refugees and asylees, VAWA self-petitioners, survivors of domestic violence, U and T visa Holders, Special Immigrant Juvenile Status, DACA, TPS, certain parolees and several other categories of non-citizens. Public charge assessment is made when- applies to enter the US, applies to adjust status to become a lawful permanent resident, a green hold leaves US for more than 180 consecutive days and re-enters. This Does NOT- applies to become US citizen (unless is within the first five years of LPR status) falls under certain categories such as refugee.
